White Cloud Press/HumankIND Project, 2014.</i>	Alter Wiener, a teenage survivor of five Nazi prison camps during World War II, describes how an unexpected person demonstrated moral courage in repeated acts of kindness toward him. Holocaust survivor Alter Weiner lived for many years in Portland, OR. (Nonfiction)	2
	<i>Hana's Suitcase</i> <i>Levine, Karen. Hana's Suitcase. Albert Whitman & Co., 2003.</i>	Concerned that Japanese children would never learn about the Holocaust, Fumiko Ishioka, the director of the Tokyo Holocaust Education Center in Japan, wanted tangible evidence. She appealed to the Auschwitz Museum in Poland to loan her a few artifacts, and she received a battered suitcase with the name "Hanna Brady" written on it. Hana's Suitcase alternates between Fumiko's and her students' quest to find clues to Hana's life, and Hana's own story. (Nonfiction)	1

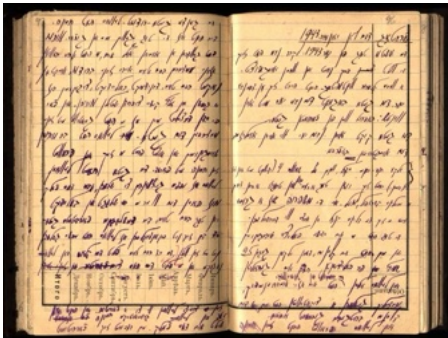
